In a few short days we will be celebrating the 4th of July. This is such a special time of the year when we gather to celebrate our country's Independence. It is a perfect opportunity to lift our prayers of gratitude for the many blessings we share as citizens of this great land.

With July upon us, we are now officially in the summer season. The children are out of school, summer camps are open, and vacation plans are underway. Vacation time, away from our usual weekly schedules, gives us a chance to unwind and to take sabbath-keeping rest.

According to the Bible, the Sabbath or Shabbat in Hebrew, is a day set aside for rest and worship. A History of Independence Day

The Fourth of July—also known as Independence Day or July 4th—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution. On July 2nd, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later delegates from the 13 colonies adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 to the present day, July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from fireworks, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues. The Fourth of July 2021 is on Sunday, July 4, 2021; the federal holiday will be observed on Monday, July 5, 2021.

When the initial battles in the Revolutionary War broke out in April 1775, few colonists desired complete independence from Great Britain, and those who did were considered radical. By the middle of the following year, however, many more colonists had come to favor independence, thanks to growing hostility against Britain and the spread of revolutionary sentiments such as those expressed in the bestselling pamphlet "Common Sense," published by Thomas Paine in early 1776.

On June 7, when the Continental Congress met at the Pennsylvania State House (later Independence Hall) in Philadelphia, the Virginia delegate Richard Henry Lee introduced a motion calling for the colonies' independence.

Amid heated debate, Congress postponed the vote on Lee's resolution, but appointed a five-man committee—including Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, John Adams of Massachusetts, Roger Sherman of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania and Robert R. Livingston of New York—to draft a formal statement justifying the break with Great Britain.

On July 2nd, the Continental Congress voted in favor of Lee's resolution for independence in a near-unanimous vote (the New York delegation abstained, but later voted affirmatively). On that day, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail that July 2 "will be celebrated, by succeeding Generations, as the great anniversary Festival" and that the celebration should include "Pomp and Parade...Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other."

On July 4th, the Continental Congress formally adopted the Declaration of Independence, which had been written largely by Jefferson. Though the vote for actual independence took place on July 2nd, from then on, the 4th became the day that was celebrated as the birth of American independence.

Fourth of July Becomes a Federal Holiday

The tradition of patriotic celebration became even more widespread after the War of 1812, in which the United States again faced Great Britain. In 1870, the U.S. Congress made July 4th a federal holiday; in 1941, the provision was expanded to grant a paid holiday to all federal employees.

Over the years, the political importance of the holiday would decline, but Independence Day remained an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism.

Falling in mid-summer, the Fourth of July has since the late 19th century become a major focus of leisure activities and a common occasion for family get-togethers, often involving fireworks and outdoor barbecues. The most common symbol of the holiday is the American flag, and a common musical accompaniment is "The Star-Spangled Banner," the national anthem of the United States.

Creamery in Edgecomb

Our Story

Blanchard's Creamery in Edgecomb was established in September of 2020. While it's founder Mary Blanchard resides in Boston, MA, her Maine dairy roots date back to over 50 years ago.

Mary was born in Damariscotta in 1969. Her father, Mac Blanchard, ran Blanchard's Dairy with his father, Everett Blanchard, in Dover-Foxcroft, ME in the 1940's. Blanchard's Dairy inspired Mac to run Damariscotta's Round Top Dairy in the 1960's.

Mary searched for an existing ice cream shop to run for two years but was unable to find one. This led her to the conclusion that she simply had to learn how to make her own ice cream. For the past two years, Mary has taught herself how to make homemade ice cream with a small Wynter 1-quart machine. After much experimenting and feeding family and friends, she arrived at enough flavors to feel she could open a shop.

During the COVID pandemic, and on a chance bike ride on the Boothbay Road, Mary discovered the barn at 660 Boothbay Road in Edgecomb. She realized her dream of opening an ice cream business the moment she stepped into the historic 1800's barn.

Dating back to the early 1800s, the barn housed dairy cows, horses, and then in its most recent history, a fabric store beloved by the community. The vacant barn, with its original wood and beautiful post and beam structure, seemed to be waiting for new life, a perfect home for Blanchard's Creamery.

Blanchard opened her doors officially Memorial Day weekend in May, 2021. Since it's opening, Mary has welcomed guests and patrons from near and far. She has received exceptionally warm support from local neighbors and natives of the area and greatly appreciates the positivity and well wishes for Blanchard's Creamery.
