February in Maine can be a bit challenging as we get through what seems like one snowstorm after another. And, even as the days get longer, darkness continues to hover over the land as we slowly make our way through the snowfalls of winter to the greening of the earth in spring. One of the ways we can celebrate this winter season is by considering the ancient Festival of Candlemas, also known as the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple and the Purification of Mary, celebrated forty days after the birth of Jesus Christ on 2nd February.

The Festival of Candlemas is associated with the triumph of light over darkness. In early church history, it was the day set aside for the blessing of all lighting tapers and candles to be used during the coming church year. Candles were blessed at church services and then carried around the parish, their light symbolizing Christ lighting the way for his followers, and going back to Simeon's words, when he blessed the Christ child and his parents in the temple. The Gospel of Luke says that when Jesus was met by Anna and Simeon, the prophet held the baby Jesus and called him a Light to the World.

Yet, Candlemas, celebrated by the lighting and extinguishing of candles, is a bittersweet feast. It observes the day Simeon also warns Mary of the pain and suffering she is to face because of her Son. So, Candlemas looks backwards to the birth of Jesus Christ and the joy of Christmas, but also forward to his suffering and death on the cross.

All of this draws us to consider how we, like Jesus, can be a light in the world. So, each evening, during the month of February, let's light a candle or even a small electric light to remind ourselves that we too, as Christians, carry Christ's light into the world. Let's remember, from ancient times, the lighted candle has been seen as a symbol of the light of Christ and God's triumph over the darkness. We are called to be God's light bearers.

One final thing. There is a tradition associated with Candlemas. Since February 2 is the midway point between the winter solstice and the spring equinox, the weather on Candlemas Day is a predictor of whether winter is nearly over.

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come winter, have another flight;

If Candlemas bring clouds and rain, Go winter, and come not again.

These days, a groundhog known as "Punxsutawney Phil" predicts the weather every 2nd February. According to legend, if Phil sees his shadow on that date, he'll return to his burrow, and we'll have six more weeks of winter. But, if he doesn't see his shadow, we can expect warmer temperatures and an early spring. I wonder what Phil will predict this year.

Whatever comes, Christ lights the way for his followers.

Looking ahead to March - Lenten Bible Study

Lent - Christian Reflection: A series in Faith and Ethics Baylor University

This 4 week study will help us examine the history of Lent, the season which begins the Church's second cycle of preparation, celebration, and rejoicing. The study will be held on Thursdays, March 9, 16, 23, 30 from 10:30 am to Noon. Please let Rev. Kate know if you are interested in participating. Reading material will be available for each week.

As part of the study, the following topics will be addressed:

* March 9 - Preparing for Joy

Lent is an invitation to honesty and clarity. It can be our preparation for joy because it is the concentrated and disciplined time when we together work to root out the blindness and deception that prevent us from receiving each other as gracious gifts from God.

* March 16 - The Early History of Lent

The season of Lent appears after the Council of Nicea. With so many biblical precedents, did it really take the Church more than 300 years to seize upon the idea of fasting for forty days? The early history of Lent is interesting and complex; it is something of a "choose your own adventure" story.

* March 23 - Walking the Walk

Walking the stations of the cross—a devotional path of reflection and repentance based on events in the passion and resurrection of Christ— is being adapted in creative ways today. How did this form of spiritual pilgrimage originate and why is it important for our discipleship.

* March 30 - Keeping Vigil

The season of Lent, and especially Holy Week, are traditional times for keeping vigil — an attentive openness to the work of God in our lives and in our world. But what does it mean to keep vigil today, when most of us no longer adhere to the strict discipline of latenight prayer?

Shaws of Wiscasset also delivers groceries to your home. Check their website for details.




